New York Natives for Clay Soils

Finding plants that will grow in clay soils can be tough, but it is not impossible. The following native plants are a good start.

Wildflowers

How do you know what your soil texture is?

A hand-texturing test is one method for determining the texture of your soil. First, add water to a small amount of dry soil, and form it into a ball if you can. Knead the soil between your fingers to form a flat ribbon. Keep pushing the soil out into the ribbon until it breaks off. To determine the texture of your soil, measure the ribbon.

- If your ribbon measures less than 1 inch long before breaking, you have loam or silt.
- If your ribbon measures 1 to 2 inches long before breaking, you have clay loam.
- If your ribbon measures more than 2 inches long before breaking, you have clay.


So if you have clay, now what? It's next to impossible to change your soil texture - instead what you should do is work on your soil structure. To improve clay soil add in as much organic matter (leaves,
